

Subject Area	Skills Developed by Loose Parts Play	Example
Math 2 3 8 9 6 5 6	 Spatial Awareness Comparing and Contrasting Patterning Geometry Measuring Counting 	Provide an assortment of loose parts, like blocks, bottle caps, and small gems. Children can sort them, count them, compare them, line them up and measure them, etc. The possibilities are endless!
Science	 Experimenting Investigating Classifying Problem Solving 	Watch Video: Loose Parts and STEAM in the Early Childhood Classroom
Dramatic Play	 Imagination Complex Story Creation 	Put tree cookies (small round slices of thin tree trunks) into dramatic play and see what the children turn them into. They might be food one day or money to buy item the next. Follow the children's interests and add additional props over the course of the week to expand on their ideas.
Language and Literacy	VocabularyConversationsStorytelling	Put out loose parts and encourage children to retell and explore familiar stories. Art

- Creativity

- Explore shapes, spaces, patterns, etc.

Put out an empty picture frame and bottle caps of various sizes. Encourage children to create pictures or designs inside their frame.

Let children explore loose parts that heighten senses. For example, let them play with herbs, pinecones, and dried flowers. As they play the can explore the smells, textures, and sounds each item makes. Include variety in color and texture when introducing items.
